
The Epistle Romans 4:13-25

[St. Paul writes:] For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were

written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

This is the Word of the Lord.

The Holy Gospel St. Mark 8: 31-38

The Holy Gospel, according to St. Mark, the 8th chapter:

Glory to You, O Lord.

Then [Jesus] began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.' This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to You, O Christ**

REV. TODD HOEFFS LENT 2 Scripture: Mark 8 February 28, 2021

The cross of Jesus shapes our vision and outlook into the life around us. Or it SHOULD.

Like a lens, the cross creates a unique window by which we see out in to the world in a Christ-like manner of live and mercy, [considering the image on the sermon slide today, \rightarrow Jesus' cut out body on a metal cross hoisted up against a landscape backdrop Vividly places before us the view of our world through His crucifixion.]

In my art teaching days, I used a drawing technique to get kids to view objects in a less preconceived way. They'd each get a sheet of paper and a pencil with a large dish towel (tea cloth) over their hand and paper with only the end of the pencil sticking out

through a small hole in the towel. I had the students fix their eyes on the still life objects in the middle of the art room and draw as their eyes trace the shapes and objects. WITH OUT LOOKING AT WHAT THEY WERE DRAWING! It was hard and unusual, but became fun and exciting to see what they could create without looking at the paper. It breaks them of trying to COPY what they are and OBSERVE what they see, and the outcome of the drawing proved how observant they could be [even if it wasn't perfect].

Fixing our eyes upon the cross shapes our view of God and our life before Him.

Looking at life around us through the cross shapes our view of other people.

Crosses mean so much to so many people.

Crosses are decorative.

Crosses are instruments of torture.

Crosses mark tombstones,

Or the occasional hospital building

There's the Red Cross

Churches are flanked with crosses set upon the bright blue sky

But the message of the cross,

The purpose of the cross

That's the part that's most often missing or neglected.


The idea of carrying a cross must've seemed crazy when Jesus talked about it. Criminals died on crosses.

A dark, yet bold image of certain excruciating death!

Cruel and brutal, crosses incited fear and compliance to Roman rule.

When Jesus says He will suffer, BE CRUCIFIED and rise from the dead on the 3rd Day – AND that ANY ONE who wished to follow Him will also **carry the cross** this is very jarring news. FEARFUL NEWS.

Jesus is inviting us to die before we live. If we want to be His people.



Sounds a bit drastic, even counter productive.

Jesus represents this new movement of mercy and teaching and sacrifice.

Those who see Jesus as being the GREAT MESSIAH OF GOD in their midst

find this prediction of death and cross carrying as defeatist.

Jesus' followers crave security, protection, restoring Israel to its former glimmering glory.

Following Jesus is not about the elimination of risks, the preservation of glory, and the ability to control. Peter is really grappling with this.

Trying to stop Jesus' plan wins Peter a Satanic title.

Those who are not FOR Jesus stand AGAINST Him.

Don't misunderstand though.

This ISN'T about living life on the lookout for wooden crosses you can start carrying. Like repentance, it's not as much about DOING as it is about BEING.

It's in the heart, our attitude, our inner selves ad the way we VIEW things.

Jesus is asking each of us to live with the risk that a life of grace and mercy creates.

To abandon love to our lives and relinquish control to God.

That's what Jesus is doing. He expects nothing less of His followers.

And gives nothing less to those He's called.

The way of Christ and His cross speaks loudly that our life is not our own.

It belongs to our Lord. Our life is not just about us.

It's about God & Who He places into our life, those crossing our paths.

There's great freedom in knowing this.

We are free to be fully alive.

We are free to live without fear.

We are free to look at people we encounter through the lens of Jesus' cross.

We are free to share what's been shared with us.

Through self denial our falling down our daily dying which becomes a rising up, where losing is saving, and death is resurrection.

Mark wrote this Gospel account about 5-8 years after our Lord ascended into Heaven. Crucifixions were still a vivid reality for any enemy of Rome.

Mark's readers knew crucifixions all too well.

They had eyewitnesses telling them exactly what happened that Friday in Jerusalem. Following Jesus is not easy but it's life changing.

ALL who *run after Jesus must forget the self, carry the cross, and follow." (Mark 8:34).* This is confusing at times.

Sometimes we talk about the unpleasant things in life as being

"the cross" that we have to bear.

But Jesus is speaking here of –

any time you suffer anxiety or trouble or hatred or loss or embarrassment or anything negative

BECAUSE you are HIS BROTHER OR SISTER IN THE FAITH -

that is bearing the cross.

This is choosing to withstand those unpleasant things because we belong to Jesus. And by not letting those negative things divert us from witnessing this Gospel message. Other things

like poor health, an unfulfilling job, family turmoil,

Stress, aggravation, anxiety,

those aren't in and of themselves the same as carrying the cross.

These life issues are the side effect of living in a sinful world.

Everyone has those problems.

They're not uniquely Christian.

They do however test us whether or not to remain firm in our faith.

Pain will cause us to choose Christ or a quick"er" fix.

But, dealing with the stresses of life & carrying our cross as Christians

will give us over to the power of the Holy Spirit

whereby we either trust in our Lord or

trust...

something else.....

It tests our confidence in God's love

to the extent that we question whether he really does care what's happening in our lives.

Yes, carrying the cross can be difficult and painful.

What if bearing a cross means

we're suddenly drawn completely into the moment when God,

in his grace,

calls us to walk with Jesus

and to follow the harder path

that means endurance and commitment and long-suffering

as we face up to being his disciples in our world today?

What if bearing a cross means we're drawn away from our own plans

at the most inconvenient time

to help others with their crosses

and bring God's grace into the lives of the people

we connect with in our corner of the world?

What if bearing a cross means we're pulled out of the shadows

and given an *uncomfortable load* (as crosses tend to be)

that we prefer not to carry -

made to stand out

and be different

because our message or beliefs or values

are different to those around us

or we're given a task that we think others can do better?

Cross bearing means doing something that *I don't particularly want to do* because it frightens me –

because ministry and service to others will confront us and challenge us and stretch us beyond what we call 'normal'.

It's this cross of grace and unselfish love that we find the hardest to carry. Because it means understanding other's life situation And helping them see it through the image of Christ crucified.

Bearing Jesus cross means dying.

Jesus got His hands and feet nailed down to it.

And we worry we can't measure up. And the good news is, we can't. Nor do we have to.

JESUS DID. HE DIED in your place.

He died in the world's place.

It is finished.

So with the cross you carry you know how the story ends.

In death, in suffering, in trouble, comes life, freedom and hope.

Make no mistake about it,

Jesus is calling all of His people into a radically different life,

a life of change, of renewal,

of turning around and going in the opposite direction you had thought you'd go.

Sacrifice and discipleship, commitment and the Gospel all go together.

To truly live, to live in Jesus,

for that Good News to really transform you, the old self must die.

Be crucified daily. Drowned out in a watery, baptismal death.

And so, discipleship means we follow a Lord,

a crucified Lord, a Lord Who made us, redeems us and calls us His own.

Who knows what carrying the cross and following Jesus will mean for us in the future? Where will this journey take you and me in the next five, ten or twenty years?

Where will it take the church, this congregation, this Lutheran Church Canada synod wide body?

When we, the church, the body of Christ in the world,

take up our cross in the mission and ministry that God's given us,

it's a challenging experience.

Crosses were never made to be comfortable in the past and neither will they be comfortable in the future.

It involves re-evaluating and maybe stepping outside customs and traditions and structures that have lost their meaning and have become roadblocks to people hearing and taking to heart the freeing Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The church is called to look again at why she exists and for what purpose.

If she is the body of Christ in the world,

if the Word and Sacraments are truly the means of grace

which change lives in miraculous ways,

then the Holy Spirit will continually work through these avenues to ensure the cross never loses its prominence.

People have a starved spiritual life,

so starved many barely realize they have it.

Reaching people can be an overwhelming thought.

But our Lord moves our hands and feet in our daily callings to the direction we need to go,

meeting the needs of people He would have us as we present the Gospel.

All of this, too, involves bearing the cross. Looking at the cross. Looking at life through the cross. And we proclaim Jesus' cross and death until He comes again By looking forward to sharing in Jesus' Holy Communion feast soon. This makes His death come alive in our lives, where His presence not only fills us but moves us to trust Him more and more. To trust in the transformative power of His cross. How we see God. How we see ourselves. How we see others. How others see themselves as only living in their dying. And like that cut out image of Jesus, Any we and all people see the world in need of a Saviour Through the Saviour's cross. Amen.
