

Syrian Refugee Sponsorship Program Update:

Dear brothers and Sisters, I just want to give you a brief update. Even though things have been quiet with the lockdown I have been in continual contact with Kareem. It has been so uplifting to see little Asser grow from just a baby a year ago to an active little toddler who soon won't let his older brother Ameer have it his own way with the toys. It is so great the Lord answered our prayers for them to be in Athens so they are close when they need to go for their interview. One of Kareem's friends is in a camp 7 hours from Athens and he came to the city bringing his family for his interview and it was cancelled so they had to travel back to the camp.

A financial update for you: to date we have raised \$9,415 and after paying for the translations needed for the family documents the balance is \$9,048.48. I am confident we will reach our goal. It is difficult to say when they will get through the process with Covid, but I firmly believe God will answer our prayers. So I ask you to keep pressing forward to the throne of our heavenly Father that He move our government process to bring these 2 little boys and their parents to experience God's love as I know you my friends here at Christ can express it and reach out with it. REV. TODD HOEFFS

Lent 4

Scripture: John 3:14-18

March 14, 2021

Working as an art instructor at a camp near NY City 25 plus years ago, for grades 1 - 8, can still hear the camp director lecturing campers about behaviour, especially curfew, Reminding them that "nothing GOOD happens after dark."

I'm sure we all can guess what he had in mind. Human nature being what it is, Safety & security must be guarded at all times, but especially after dark.

Darkness and light are woven through John's Gospel account

Under the cover of darkness, a religious man seeks the company of Jesus.

Is this a fact-finding mission for information to pass on to the other religious leaders, or the Roman authorities? Is truth being sought here?

Nicodemus. A highly intelligent, respected religious man.

His own name means "victory of the people". His religiousness isn't his victory, but faith in God, and even more so, his belief and understanding of WHO Jesus is And WHAT He is on earth to do are the VICTORY of the people. Nicodemus is a Pharisee. Often, they're depicted as bad guys and enemies of real faith in God. The Pharisees are highly respected religious leaders. They worked diligently in their efforts to keep God's law. After generation of wandering and slavery to foreign powers, Pharisees feared the faith and culture of Israel was slipping away. They grew very strong under the Greek and then Roman rule. They held sway over all that was taught and believed about God. Not only what Scripture passages got spoken but how it would be interpreted. Godly rules fixed everyone's place in religious society.

Most often, this lifestyle gave Pharisees the false sense of security in their conceived path to God and Heaven. So, when Jesus arrives, the Pharisees feel very threatened. His signs and sermons and mingling with people challenged their proud adherence to the law and the privilege and prestige they grew into in their roles as religious leaders to the Israelite Jews. Jesus traveled around and sat at many unsavoury tables.

Pharisees and all of the religious leaders did not travel and teach and live with people and eat at any table. They fixed their place in Jerusalem and YOU came to THEM.

That is why we hear them question Jesus when it comes to the law –

Scolding His behaviour – Healing people on the Sabbath, breaking bread and touching outcasts and the religious unclean. This is all NEW and received to Pharisee ears as BEING AGAINST God. The Pharisees are God-fearing, devout, regularly worshiping people of God, just like so many of us. Unlike Nicodemus, who must be curious. He's drawn to him, but clearly not ready to be publicly associated with Jesus. He knows of the signs Jesus has been performing.

He opens up the Scriptures and talks with divine authority.

"How can these things be?" he finally asks Jesus from the deep shadows of the darkness. It must be disappointing and frustrating to hear Jesus suggest that Nicodemus of all people must be "born anew." (3:3) Literally this means "born from above."

Nicodemus misses the funny play on words and takes Jesus quite literally as "born a second time." "Can someone crawl into their mother's womb and be born again?" (3:4b) Perhaps the problem is that Nicodemus thinks he's got God all figured out.

He wants Jesus to enable him in his rigid religious beliefs as if he's on the right path to God. But it's problematic and downright impossible to define or control God.

Nicodemus can't even determine his own journey to God.

Being BORN FROM ABOVE is something that happens to us Not something we can make ourselves. God can only birth people from Heaven. That birthing from above is faith. A daily dying and a daily being born.

We too may find ourselves as Nicodemus does here – so firmly footed in what we've always understood to be right and true in our religious identities.

In those times we may really struggle to open that identity up – let it be expanded, challenged, maybe even changed as we grow in our study of scriptures and time spent listening for God's voice. Nicodemus must have been wondering in part, how can it possibly be this simple? How it is that God can do this without having to DO anything? The Pharisee's had inherited mountains of legal interpretation, guidelines, and examples on how to keep God's law perfectly. The temple sacrifices, the offerings, the chanted psalms, all given by God in the Scriptures as preparation.

Those were not an end in and of themselves, but a path toward getting one's own heart ready to receive the Saviour. And now He's here and there's a million reasons why so many reject Him. Jesus is saying we can inherit the kingdom of God through some new and unusual birth in water and the Spirit?

Nicodemus knows about ritual washing and the Spirit promised but yet to be.

So overwhelming. But Jesus doesn't let him off the hook.

He's a prominent religious teacher and leader. Known and respected HE SHOULD know these things.

The promise of faith in the coming Saviour is woven into the entire old Testament. It's just that the administration of the interpretation of God's Law and the policing of Israel's religious behaviour took precedence over the Word and Promises of God. We can see that Jesus is talking about our baptisms here.

And even when it doesn't seem to make sense – seems too good to be true – Jesus asks that we trust what he is saying. "Do not be astonished that I said to you, 'You must be born from above.' The wind blows where it chooses, and you hear the sound of it, but you do not know where it comes from or where it goes." (3:7-8)

We certainly know that wind is still there,

Like the rushing Pentecost wind and fire of the pouring out of the Holy Spirit, just as we know the mark of our baptism is always there and the flame of faith deep inside our hearts. It takes Nicodemus time to step out of the dark and make sense of Jesus' Light. Later on, as John records in Chapter 7, Nicodemus begins to speak out, begins to come out of the shadows. When his colleagues, the Pharisees, push forward aggressively to have Jesus arrested and shut up once and for all, Nicodemus speaks up. "'Our law does not judge people without first giving them a hearing to find out what they are doing, does it?'

They replied, 'Surely you are not also from Galilee, are you? Search and you will see that no prophet is to arise from Galilee.'" (7:50-52)

It's as if Nicodemus mustered just enough courage. It's as if his belief grew to ensure the True Light shines into the world. He is simultaneously questioning the conduct of the Pharisees **AND** whether or not this could really be true – these things he's hearing and starting to believe about Jesus. Nicodemus could actually be one who can do something as simple and powerful as furthering Jesus' message rather than building mountains of law. For God so loved the WHOLE WORLD Jesus tells him And this Jesus comes into this WHOLE world NOT for condemnation

But that the WHOLE WORLD can be saved through HIS LIFE.

He dies and we live. We daily die and live in Him. That's being born from above. In Nicodemus we can see who we really are. Our journey during Lent, and throughout life, means trust, surrender, letting go of being in charge, and letting God's Spirit wash over us again. Faith is not having all the right answers, or keeping all the law and rules perfectly, but asking questions opening us to new directions and insights about our God. Kind of like Nicodemus asking Jesus, "How can these things be?"

The Spirit is at work moving and guiding that we remain in our relationship with God As those who are born from above. Faith leads us to trust as we walk; faith helps us to ask important questions. Faith is the openness to new insights, new relationships. Faith is the journey where the Spirit takes the lead, and takes us where He chooses. We cannot help ourselves be worthy of forgiveness.

Nor can we earn eternal life, which, by the way, begins in the here and now as we follow Jesus, sharing his unconditional love, and it then continues beyond this life. These gifts are the result of God's astounding, unconditional love for humanity. Right at the moment of our baptisms, we're promised this eternal life with God through Christ here and now. Doing us the good it needs ensuring we are always born anew. Even though we cannot fully live up to the law and we never will.

We hear this all the time in the scriptures and in our churches, and yet ... we wonder... Are my sins really forgiven? Am I really good enough? Do I really deserve this? And then we're tempted to retreat like Nicodemus back into the presumed safety of the shadows, forgetting that this doesn't have anything to do with "deserve," – only Grace. We don't deserve the goodness and mercy we receive. That's the point. No one deserves it. This is why God loved the WHOLE WORLD enough to make Jesus Pay the debt of such deserved punishment. Punishment received in full at Calvary's cross. Even Nicodemus, Still stepped in Pharisaical culture, Viewed the dead corpse of Jesus on the cross and assisted Joseph of Arimathea in taking the body down from the cross And buried in the garden tomb. Nicodemus provided the myrrh and aloes.

A costly duty, as he risked his entire reputation on this loving act.

Nicodemus is boldly proclaiming with his very presence:

Jesus is worthy of burial because HE is the Saviour of the World.

Jesus IS God come to earth to walk among us, teach us, open the scriptures fully and to lay down His life in exchange for ours. The mountains of legal rules, the cultural dos and don'ts, melt away in the hope our crucified and risen Saviour gives. Nicodemus teaches us well. That we who are in the dark can only come into the light by God's

mighty act of saving us in Jesus and He understands how many of us come into our relationship with Him gradually, with questions and doubts and that's OK. A Scriptural theme and a pattern in our own lives. Nicodemus, like so many of us, is a person of faith,

And his full belief gets held back by his own perceived certainty that has come out of his religious community.

But the Holy Spirit is working hard here – calling and moving all people that all might come to faith and trust in Christ for all things.

Where do we hold tightly to traditions only for the sake of those traditions? We know better. We've been born from above.

We've had faithful teachers showing and telling us the Gospel.

Amen.

We have the courageous faith moving us into God's light exposing our sin and failings—and we need never, ever be worried about shunning or ridicule from our God. It's true, there may be risk and pain in exposing our whole selves to this light. But when we do ... when we dare to let the light fall on places where we need to forgive or be forgiven, places that are too heavy for us to bear on our own, we find, actually, that we are quite safe and freed. We are released of all that works against us And given over into the comfort of Christ. And we are then in positions of service To help others be released from their failings Not to condemn, but to soothe with the same saving Gospel. Because the ever-living truth is that nothing can ever keep us away from God's promises. While it may still be true nothing good happens in the dark, It is through the dark Jesus took Nicodemus into light And because of that Jesus's love for the WHOLE WORLD, Like Nikodemus, we are people of the victory in Christ!
