WORD

The First Reading: The Acts of the Apostles 4: 1-12

While Peter and John were speaking to the people, the priests, the captain of the temple, and the Sadducees came to them, much annoyed because they were teaching the people and proclaiming that in Jesus there is the resurrection of the dead. So they arrested them and put them in custody until the next day, for it was already evening. But many of those who heard the word believed; and they numbered about five thousand. The next day their rulers, elders, and scribes assembled in Jerusalem, with Annas the high priest, Caiaphas, John, and Alexander, and all who were of the high-priestly family. When they had made the prisoners stand in their midst, they inquired, 'By what power or by what name did you do this?' Then Peter, filled with the Holy Spirit, said to them, 'Rulers of the people and elders, if we are questioned today because of a good deed done to someone who was sick and are asked how this man has been healed, let it be known to all of you, and to all the people of Israel, that this man is standing before you in good health by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead. This Jesus is "the stone that was rejected by you, the builders; it has become the cornerstone." There is salvation in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given among mortals by which we must be saved.' This is the Word of the Lord.

The Epistle: 1 John 3: 16-24

We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us—and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. The Holy Gospel: St. John 10:11-18


The Holy Gospel, according to St. John, the 10th chapter:

Glory to You, O Lord.

[Jesus says:] 'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'



The Good Shepherd.

The oldest Christian image

incorporated into nearly every dining room wall

in the homes where followers of the risen Christ gathered in the early days of the church.

A great consoling, relaxing image to believers persecuted by the Roman authorities.

Think of images or stories that console you?

I still love my paperback picture book of "Curious George Goes to The Hospital"

I received as a 3 year old after getting my tonsils out.

These stores and images put us in a calm place.

The Good Shepherd image for me didn't do that...

only the part about "spreading a table before me"...must be a food/appetite thing for me! LOL

Beloved John's depiction of Jesus in this way comes through the lens of

Psalm 23 — "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want . . .

he leads my beside the still waters, he restoreth my soul..."

Since Jesus is also viewed as the Son of David, the shepherd King Messiah,

the provider/protector image has become central in Christian life.

Sheep and shepherds aren't a direct part of our culture today.

But the consolation early Christians felt has so much to do with His self-sacrificial care. He helps by giving fully of Himself. NO MATTER WHAT IT TAKES.

Even dying.

As in

Laying down his life for the sheep.

Just as a shepherd in the Biblical culture would lie down at the doorway of the sheep as a protector. Any predator coming close would be easily seen and prevented from killing the sheep. This is where the saying "over my dead body" originates.

Every Christian in the Roman era suffering life and death persecution found this to have immeasurable peaceful value. Because dying isn't the end of this protection.

Jesus lays down His life so in order to take it up again.

Laying down his life for the flock (on a cross on Good Friday), and taking it up again (alive on Easter morning).

Notice the image in the bulletin this morning. The image on my message slide.

The figure with outstretched arms, like a crucified form, is just that - Jesus crucified,

as the cross is the shape and way He lays down His life for the sheep – all the sheep – who are pictured before Him huddled together, going in all different directions.

Through His outstretched arms of mercy, as He's dying He's protecting, welcoming, bringing in all sheep from fear and confusion to the perfect harmony of His Father's fold. But Jesus isn't only the protecting shepherd, he's the actual physical gate through which we all enter. He's the way in and out.

He provides the passageway to find the sweet green grasses for grazing.

Church life is similar. We enter in through His Body, as a Baptismal passage.

We don't choose who's in the flock and who's not.

While we trust in Baptism along with God's Word and promises, we don't set the standards of membership. Ours is not the job of judging or rating the value of another.

In this section of our Lord's great flock here – we've been called to embrace and imitate the welcoming gate that is Jesus – as we seek to share his love with all creation.

As we strive to emulate the reach of our Lord's shepherd's hook which is both strong and gentle. And so, living in the fold, once we've entered through the waters of baptism, joined to Christ's death and resurrection, we are made one with all who live and die in Him. In Christ's nail scarred and glorified body we are gathered in with the other sheep: walking and learning, feeding and watering, resting and serving.

One flock, one shepherd.

One bread, one body, one Lord of all.

One hope, one faith, one birth, that is, this new baptismal birth.

Or at times.

Do our egos and our desires, our determination to have it our way, cause us to transform from sheep who've entered through the gate of Jesus, — turning into thieves and bandits who seek to steal what we want of the flock:

or do we even chase others away by our less than Jesus-centered behavior.

When we enter through Jesus the gate, confessing our sinfulness, we are aware and assured of forgiveness and we are called to live doing the same as we work for justice and love mercy. Once in our Lord's flock, do we trust in His abundance?

Or are we blinded from seeing that God truly provides for all our wants?

We get traumatized by seeking more that can spread through the flock,

misguiding us into thinking that there's not enough for all so we better hoard what we can:

hoard resources, hoard power, hoard control, hoard attention.

Then we run the risk of assisting in the poisoning of the faith and growth of the other sheep.

Then, what are we really communicating about the Good shepherd and we, His sheep, by our actions? If we tell the world that we follow the Good Shepherd.

by our actions? If we tell the world that we follow the Good Shepherd,

that we've entered by faith through him and by his leading we continually find our guidance, care, protection and identity; how does the world then see this King of Love we call shepherd in the way that the flock walks together, cares for one another,

carries out the mission of the one we follow, reaches to the ones who appear to be not a part of us? In us and through us others will see the Good Shepherd's flock as something that they're drawn to, or repelled from...

Because, Jesus Himself says THERE ARE OTHER SHEEP NOT OF THIS FOLD—Notice - outside the fold other sheep hear the voice of Jesus, and are willing to follow. In context of John's Gospel, it's a direct hit to the religious authorities and those who thought they knew who's in and who's out of God's Kingdom.

Jesus is saying the outside GENTILES are also HIS SHEEP!

John wrote this while transitioning from a Jewish dominated church to a Gentile one. Debates had erupted as early as Paul's ministry as to how this was going to work.

No matter the tensions, Jesus the Good Shepherd has come for all people to be of one flock, with one shepherd.

Even though we all know and experience a predominantly Gentile church, we still continue to struggle with the question of who is in and who is out.

The Christian world is rather diverse, with thousands of different versions.

Down through the ages, attempts have been made to determine who has the most "correct faith" and who has not. Martin Luther's advice on worthiness for receiving Holy Communion is still the best "test" for faith in general – he or she is fully prepared who believes in the words "given and shed for you for the forgiveness of all your sins." That's far better than trying to see if you like or dislike the same people God likes or dislikes. That can only hurt the fabric of the church, for all belong to Christ, all are loved and wanted by God, all are included in His mercy and grace. Thanks be to God there are OTHER sheep, or else we wouldn't be included! Could it be that the other sheep include the Samaritan woman whom Jesus meets at a well and engages in a rather interesting theological conversation about worship?

What about the tax collectors he has dinner with and the revolutionaries who appear to have joined his band? Then there's all the women who seem to be following him.

Besides that, there are the lepers and sick and the injured who look to him for help.

Time and again Jesus welcomed into his fold those whom his culture deemed unclean.

We're not so perfect that we don't need shepherding and guiding.

When we follow our own impulses, we consequently find ourselves in shadowy valleys of trouble:

in disagreements with friends;

in trouble with someone;

ostracized by those we'd hoped would be our friends;

caught in the traps of past failures;

pestered by doubts -

frightened at the uncertain and ever darkening future.

Yes, in love for the other sheep who can hear His voice calling, Jesus gathers a scattered humanity back from such a situation, and return all people to God.

Because of Jesus' outstretched embrace while dying on the cross,

the world is gathered into His welcoming, forgiving body.

There all our sins and shortcomings and misgivings fade away in the shed blood of our shepherd, Who dies that we all might live. And by laying down His life and taking it up again, we as His sheep bask in the peaceful still waters and vibrant green pastures.

We hear His voice when the Bible is read,

when forgiveness is spoken,

when you hear "take eat, this is My Body"

or "take and drink, this is My Blood, for you it's shed."

Fear not for you've entered the fold in Jesus' Body, all is safe.

The good shepherd is worthy of our trust and confidence.

Because He instills in us the gifts we need to trust.

We have an identity, a community and a fellowship for worship & nourishment.

As members of our Lord's flock, we can fear not for:

Shepherd Jesus is the gate, into Him all enter by faith;

Shepherd Jesus finds us when we've gone astray, returning us home;

Shepherd Jesus sets a table with His Bread and Wine, in the face of our enemies;

Shepherd Jesus is leading as we travel the valley filled with death's dark shadows; Shepherd Jesus is life and peace and safety and hope.

Shepherd Jesus makes sure all OTHER SHEEP, like us, hear His voice and are nourished along with us into life everlasting. Amen.
