


Have mercy on us and forgive us, O Lord.

The Old Testament: <u>Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23</u>

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher, vanity of vanities! All is vanity...I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem, applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to human beings to be busy with. I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind....I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after me —and who knows whether they will be wise or foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labours under the sun, because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

The Epistle: Colossians 3:1-11

[St. Paul writes:] So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with him in glory. Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. But now you must get rid of all such things—anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

The Holy Gospel: St. Luke 12:13-21 The Holy Gospel, according to St. Luke, the 12th chapter: Glory to You, O Lord.

Someone in the crowd said to Jesus, 'Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me.' But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?' And Jesus said to them, 'Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions.' Then he told them a parable: 'The land of a rich man produced abundantly. And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?" Then he said, "I will do

this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." But God said to him, "You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?" So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich towards God.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to You, O Christ!



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REV. TODD HOEFFS Pentecost 8 Luke 12:13-21 July 31, 2022

"What do you give to the person who has everything?" Well. The quick answer is: Nothing. If they have it all, what's left to give? You know the type. They buy themselves things all the time. Like the man described by Jesus in His story today. He has everything – or so he thinks. Jesus is illustrating that having things is sometimes not as big of a problem As just simply wanting things. A voice coming from the crowd of people around Jesus wants his perceived rightful half of an inheritance. This "voice" knows who Jesus is. Calls Him "teacher". The question is relevant to ancient world middle-eastern family inheritance. Usually it's divided among the siblings, especially the male siblings. Jesus can give a judgement. Yet Jesus claims no such authority to judge this money matter. Not that it's insignificant, but the intent of the voice in the crowd is his wanting. "Watch out," He says. "Be on your guard against all covetousness." Hmmm...is that person coveting? Jesus obviously sees the heart and knows the question isn't about fairness, but favour. Coveting is a problem. The original Greek Luke uses to write this literally means-holding onto more. Like when you carry too much because you're in a hurry and things start to drop. You have already. But you want more and more and more....The ancient Greek culture called attributed coveting as jealousy – and such people were looked upon as parasites. Users. Freeloaders. Wanting more is not only about grabbing, but imagining more, dreaming of more, craving more. Sometimes when we want things so badly that we get upset when we don't have

them. Coveting FIXATES on the thing, and at times can lose perspective and just get caught up in the wanting. Contentment is the opposite of coveting. Contentment is a gift of God, a trait of thankfulness and gratitude. It's as important as peace.

Contentment is healthy – allows us to grow. Contentment helps us model kindness and sharing. Part of our calling as the baptized Body of Christ is living contented lives.

Contentment is based on trust which comes from faith And the memory of God's goodness – which soothes the wanting more. Because fear is at the heart of coveting. So Jesus' story points to a rich man whose ground produces plentifully. PLOUTOS is the Greek word for rich.

Like WDW dog PLUTO! PLOUTOS is the Greek god of wealth and farm growth!

Very fitting for the story. The Rich man's crops grew so over abundantly they didn't fit into his barns. He doesn't build extra. Or extensions. No, he tears them down and builds bigger ones.

Wasteful, extravagant, arrogant and unnecessary. And notice the way the rich man speaks-

He talks to himself as if his own person is someone else? [his own self is mentioned 12 times!!!]

His self is disjointed from reality. His persona is divorced from his own neighbours and community. He is not even selfish any longer – He is fully owned and consumed by his possessions and wealth.

Possessions, riches and money aren't the problem. We need to remember that.

The high value we and all people place upon these things is the problem.

Numbers don't lie, but money does. Money and things tell us -- "If you lose me, you lose a very large part of your life. If you lose me, you lose what life can be for you.

I am your life. Do you realize how big I am? Life will be *real* life — truly life — if you have me."

That's what the voice from the crowd is truly asking -

The inheritance HE WANTS, like the rich man's abundance.

Such things fight for 1st place in our lives and we get afraid if we don't have them.

The richest blocked out the Light of Christ, the greatest of all treasures.

Building bigger barns isn't bad either ----- if you're storing the grain for a use that shows God is your treasure [by helping others eat]. But the rich guy wants to relax, eat, drink, be merry.

That's his treasure, his value. This love earns him as fool title from Jesus. Life must be defined by generosity not in craving for more. This may make us a bit uncomfortable too.

We like to relax, eat, drink, enjoy, put money into the bank. Doesn't God want us to have some fun? Can't we save up for something big? What about retirement? What about vacations? These are all fine in and of themselves. God never begrudges His children anything. HOW MUCH WE VALUE THESE THINGS is the issue.

Whatever pushes God away from dwelling on the throne of our heart is wrong.

No matter how important we think it might be. It can start out small and grow big and at times we're even unaware. This is why Jesus' parable also reveals how our need for security gets in the way. With interest rates climbing, mortgages, loans increasing, Cost of living, inflation, groceries now costing \$1-\$5 more for each item – Security is a big priority. Retirement? Don't we need to save for that? And what about having money on hand for a rainy day? Truthfully, our Lord knows and understands our need for security. But when does security end and controlling of our destiny begin? Safety verses certainty. Life in this world offers no guarantees, as the rich man proves.

His soul is taken to God and the barns of stuff mean nothing. In fact, they indict him and his fate isn't promising. If COVID has shown us anything it is that "goods laid up for many years" is a lie.

The ancient church had a saying: "The rich man did not realize that the bellies of the poor were much safer storerooms than his barns." "Safer." Not only is sharing with the poor generous and loving, but it is safer. True security trusts in God. True security believes when Jesus says we are more than what we have. Jesus supports and sustained this way of faith.

"One's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions." So, what does one's life consist OF? If not riches, then...what? A richness toward God. That is, in the things of God. What God values, we value.

1st is FAITH IN HIS SON, JESUS - - which IS a treasured gift.

2nd is LOVING YOUR NEIGHBOUR AS YOURSELF.

Rich toward God is being Christ to others. Be as Christ in the way we treat others.

There's a vast richness in this. Kindness, mercy, compassion, humility, helping, welcoming. Rich toward God is priceless. That contentment comes when we trust who we are when we're in God's hands. That peace soothes our worries. Love soothes our hurts. Truth soothes our wanting. Fixating NOT on things but on what God HAS given us Sharpens our memory for His goodness over the course of our lives. Rich towards God is always knowing what He does for us every day. That is really a richness I hope and pray others would want, too.

Christians are content. God is with us and that he has loved us abundantly. So the Spirit through God's Word daily empties us of ourselves, that we will be full of Christ. Not even God can give something to those who have everything. We slowly loosen our grip on our possessions, that Christ may free us; we stop seeing ourselves as needing more than others have, so that Christ may forgive us; we stop seeing our time as our own, so that Christ can use us.

He feeds the hungry, he forgives sinners, he strengthens the weak, He raises the dead. So we learn to see ourselves as hungry, as sinners, as weak, as dead.

All the things we think we have are *potentially* useful; but they are only *actually* useful when we let them go, share them, trust that Christ will use them to our good, to other's good and to God's glory. Keep holding on to our stuff, and we lose Jesus. Let go of wanting only our stuff, and we receive him. Then our richness toward God allows us to use earthly things to show How much we value what God values. That our will now is aligned with His will to show how much you value God.

Christ comes AS our source of LOVE when other things try and lure us away.

When voices try to shout over Jesus' voice,

He comes and stands there as our judge and arbiter.

While Satan demands our soul,

Jesus lays down His life to spare us from the traps of despair and darkness.

The blood price pays the price no amount of barns or coins could fulfill.

The Bloodied cross makes it a done deal.

ALL is forgiven. You are loved. You are valued. And what's more, you have an inheritance. Jesus has won all of us abundant life and joy and peace and contentment.

We are not only rich toward God, but we are also rich toward one another.

We can spare a listening ear.

We can do all things through Him Who is our source of strength.

Now you are all people who have everything! Amen.
