THE SCRIPTURES

The Old Testament: Proverbs 25: 2-10

It is the glory of God to conceal things, but the glory of kings is to search things out. As the heavens for height, and the earth for depth, so the heart of kings is unsearchable. Take away the dross from the silver, and the smith has material for a vessel; take away the wicked from the presence of the king, and his throne will be established in righteousness. Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence or stand in the place of the great, for it is better to be told, "Come up here," than to be put lower in the presence of a noble. What your eyes have seen do not hastily bring into court, for what will you do in the end, when your neighbor puts you to shame? Argue your case with your neighbor himself, and do not reveal another's secret, lest he who hears you bring shame upon you, and your ill repute have no end.

The Epistle: Hebrews 13: 1-16 Let brotherly and sisterly love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body. Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous. Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So we can confidently say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear, what can man do to me?" Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. We have an altar from which those who serve the tent have no right to eat. So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through his own blood. Therefore let us go to him outside the camp and bear the reproach he endured. For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city that is to come. Through him then let us continually offer up a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that acknowledge his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

The Holy Gospel, according to St. Luke, the 14th chapter: **Glory to You, O Lord.**


One Sabbath, when Jesus went to dine at the house of a ruler of the Pharisees, they were watching him carefully...Then Jesus told a parable to those who were invited, when he noticed how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, "When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, lest someone more distinguished than you be invited by him, and he who invited you both will come and say to you, 'Give your place to this person,' and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher.' Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

This is the Gospel of the Lord: Praise to You, O Christ!



And also with you. Amen.



REV. TODD HOEFFS PENTECOST 12 (SERIES C) Scripture: St. Luke 14:1, 7-14 August 28, 2022 + 10 AM "Down is up and up is down"

[Note – some of this message may be edited further before it is preached on Sunday.]

One of my university friends [Daemen College Amherst NY] in the early 90s got both of us snuck into a Rolling Stones Concert [in then Rich Stadium]. My friend knew a few security guards who let us pass into the stadium into the proverbial NOSE BLEED CHEAP SEATS. If we didn't draw attention to ourselves the guards promised to move us up closer to the stage. Every ½ hour we got ushered up closer and closer. By the end of the concert, we got as close as 5 rows away from the stage. Great spot...too bad I have a better memory of moving around the concert than actually remembering the Rolling Stones themselves!

Today we don't have the awareness of just how important mobility had once been at dinners & meals. Weddings today come close with assigned seating but no one changes table to get ahead socially. We're too used to restaurants and lunch counters and food courts where we eat around all kinds of people. Cheap seats at a concert, economy section of an airplane, those delineations we know according to class & financial ability & roles.

In Jesus' time, meal tables played a crucial role in family and social culture. When an Israelite provided a meal for a guest, even a stranger, it assured him not only of the host's hospitality, but of his protection and full inclusion into the community. It totally set a person on a great future path.

Ancient dinner parties could also be political affairs. Inviting the right people affected a person's standing and influence. Accepting an invitation to such a dinner carried with it the expectation that the one invited would return the favour. Obviously, in the unlikely event they'd get an invite, poor people usually wouldn't accept since they could never repay.

The dinner party recorded in Luke's Gospel involves Pharisees. They tended <u>not</u> to be particularly wealthy. But they had a lot of influential control over the religious climate which inadvertently controlled the popular social structure. They'd fight and bargain for high positions at great meals so that they'd end up in a seat of honour.

Hence, Jesus' advice in the form of a parable.

Humility, good manners, good conversations all helped one move from a poor seat to a better seat close to the host. ACT humble and obedient as a show and you'll go far. Don't sit in the best seat only to have the host move you down. What an insult that would be!

The highest embarrassment at an influential dinner at that time would be for a host to ask a guest to move down from his favoured chair to a lower seat. You'd feel like a problem person: someone who thought too much of him or herself, one who didn't know his/her place, and a drop in your prestige. So, act humble, act good, and all is well was the mantra of the day. How often we see this kind of insecure social maneuvering in our workplace, with our friends, even in our family units!?

Jesus is well aware of the false humility of those in His audience. Last week He called leaders of the synagogue hypocrites. This is why He cuts through the fake humility and tells any host who invites: ASK THOSE WHO CAN'T REPAY YOU!

Serve those who need food and drink but don't need the social posturing. Don't invite to dinner those who are already respected or who are in a position to reward their hospitality or who

would invite them back in return. Invite the outcast – the poor, the sick, the socially undesirable, and in contrast, the lowly and humble.

This would be shocking to Jesus' listeners! It just didn't happen. If being around people didn't help you in one way or another to get ahead, you didn't bother.

Jesus' whole life is centered on inviting into the presence of God those who neither expect nor deserve such an invitation. And He expects us to do the same. He expects us, that is, to stop counting the costs, benefits, and rewards of our actions and live from a sense of abundance and blessing.

We tend to count the cost. With groceries & car purchases it's wise. But not so with people. We tend to live with the sure conviction that there is NOT enough. Not enough money, time, prestige, resources, recognition...you name it. And that conviction seems sure, even unquestionable, because so much in our culture – and particularly the advertisements & images we're relentlessly subjected to – ALL tell us there isn't.

What if there's enough and more than enough to go around? What difference would that make in our own peace of mind and the way we treated others? What if we saw others not as competitors for scarce resources but as partners, even fellow brothers and sisters, blessed and loved by God Who lives sharing His goodness and grace with all people!?

There is something simply joyful – and truly freeing – about giving to others out of a sense of abundance. From the great supply of daily bread with which we've been given!

And that's the point of Jesus' invitation. Don't count costs and rather share with others and be a blessing to all you meet. Humbly know your place and realize you're a forgiven creature in Christ just like everyone else. And the Spirit will open your heart and life to people who can do nothing for you.

This is Jesus' Way, a Way which cuts against the grain of life's advancing. A Way which slaps those in the face who try to work it any other way. We can't escape it; we see it in our communities, our jobs, in nursing homes, even in churches. Think of those people who only talk to you when they want something...maybe you and I have done that ourselves, too? That's when self-promoting sin gives way to a humbled heart secure in our Lord Who lifts up those who're down and brings down those who posture themselves upward.

This *is who Jesus is*, the Great Reverser of our priorities, our wants and our values. Because there's no end to the game of who's "in" and who's "out," and our Lord in his wisdom knows our anxious scramble for greatness will lead to nothing but more anxiety, more wants, more loneliness, more distress, and more devastation. Because Jesus' kingdom is not a kingdom of scarcity; it's one of abundance. Where all are already welcome, already loved, already cherished, already forgiven, arms swift to embrace. Because the currency of that kingdom is humility, not arrogance; generosity, not stinginess; hospitality, not fear.

"For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." The way up is down. To try to "work up" is to risk being "put down." The honoured are indeed humbled by God in the work of Christ on the cross for us. We who are humbled trust not in our self or our own ways, but in God's way.

Which is Jesus' Way. Taking the place in the cheap seats, far from the host, near the neglected. Jesus humbled Himself. Sitting among the lost, the poor, resting His head on the shoulders of the forgotten, and with those who could never pay back the treasures of His compassion.

And after the most wonderful of meals He left His table of welcome and traveled down the road to Calvary. He humbled Himself further, this time taking the seat of suffering between 2 sinners on a cross. In the nails and thorns Jesus embraced the shameful sins of every person. He embraced it all in a liberating sacrifice. And because of Jesus' sacrifice, He's lifted way up and seated at the right hand of God. And Jesus now calls us, with arms stretched in a warm and wide invitation, bidding us to take our seat next to Him at the heavenly banquet and beside those blessed humbled patrons He welcomed long ago.

Imagine living in the freedom of no longer worrying about what others think and simply be kind and helpful to everyone around us, particularly those who are not often the recipients of kindness. What would it look like at work, at school, and at the places we volunteer or play sports or socialize, to look out for those who seem off to the margin and to invite them into the center by inviting them into our lives?

Our lives as the baptized followers of Christ, who've been invited into His intimate dinner by grace, means we live as invitations for others to see and receive. An invitation to a life freed from the unnecessary and burdensome worries of what everyone else thinks, an invitation to experience the joy of being Christ to the people in handing out the abundant gifts of life and peace and value with which we've been blessed.

When we gather at Jesus' table, we leave behind the insistence of upward mobility and kneel elbow to elbow with different people made into one family, the body of Christ in the world, eating and drinking His Feast. Dining on Jesus' meal, taking Him into our bodies, not only is humbling but strengthens our confidence in Christ's power to transform us, renew us, hold us and lead us to the Great Heavenly Feast with countless seats and room for all. Amen.
