



The Old Testament: Jeremiah 14: 7-10, 19-22

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Holy Gospel: St. Luke 18: 9-14

The Holy Gospel, according to St. Luke, the 18th chapter:

Glory to You, O Lord.

Jesus also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: 'Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax-collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, "God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax-collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income." But the tax-collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted.' This is the Gospel of the Lord.

THE NICENE CREED

Lord, have mercy.




Lord, have mercy.

And finally gracious God, bring us at last through all trials and deliver us into Your Kingdom without end; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. **Amen.**





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
THE LORD'S PRAYER



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REV. TODD HOEFFS PENTECOST 20

Scripture: St. Luke 18:9-14

October 23, 2022

"God always liked YOU best..."

We compare things all the time. Maple Leafs or Senators? With the Baseball World Series in view, Yankees or Astros [and I'm hoping Yankees]? Chocolate or Strawberry ice cream? Roses or orchids? Wine or beer? What members have here the longest? Who volunteers the most? Who contributes the most or the best of whom they are? Most of the time comparisons are innocent and help create healthy competition motivating us to improve our skills and nurture growth.

Alberta Lutheran churches following the WW 2 years advertised envelope#s, names and amounts on narthex bulletin boards to inspire better giving. But this only negatively boosted pride and arrogance. Very unhealthy competition.

Competition can spiral into a nasty disease within individuals and communities. When the comparison changes from abilities to personal attacks, we've stepped into dangerous territory. Its then very easy assuming a person's value is strictly related to their contribution to society. And the more success one has, the more that person is valued over others. If we aren't at the top, shame fills our spirits and makes us feel as if we are worthless humans. [Like shut-ins in nursing homes who say 'I'm no good for nothing"...we need to encourage and support...] they can pray, empathize, care, even witness with whoever administers to them....

Jesus says we cannot earn our salvation but that by believing in Him, we have the gift of total and complete forgiveness. Our reputations in this life have NO bearing whatsoever on our salvation. Look at the people Jesus hung out with during his life.

Jesus speaks today of a Pharisee and a tax collector coming to the Temple. To Jesus' audience, the Pharisees aren't villains. They observe the law dutifully. They are respected and honoured. And, the Pharisee here goes above and beyond the letter of the law. He fasts twice a week instead of just once (as the law called for), he gives 10 percent on everything he gets, not just food and animals (again, as the law called for).

The tax collector, on the other hand, is most definitely the 'bad guy.' They're Jewish people working for their oppressors, the Roman Empire. The Romans required a certain amount of tax to be turned in, but anything extra these men made they'd keep. This made them traitors and religiously unclean. The fact that the tax collector goes home justified is unimaginable and made many listeners cringe with disgust.

We have two extremes described here. One who thinks he does everything right and one who knows he's doing wrong. The Pharisee thinks what he does makes him really good! As if he does nothing wrong. It's always someone else that messes things up. Just look at how bad the tax-collecting, lowlife traitor is. The Pharisee is in denial of his own sinfulness.

He hides it in the closet and locks the door while defending his behavior so that he feels acceptable because he believes that it is his good behavior that will save him. When he totally misunderstands that God's grace gives him and all people the ability to DO GOOD through that free grace! This Temple setting is also important and very telling. At that time where a person could stand inside temple clearly indicates their 'place' in society. The temple had rules related to insiders and outsiders. The Pharisee and the Tax Collector would've stood far apart. Each held different positions, different standings, in the temple and in their minds, toward Go. This will all be undone when at the moment of Jesus' death the curtain of the temple is torn in two from top to bottom, which forever breaks down the division between God and humanity. Jesus' life, death and resurrection changes everything, removes all boundaries.

We compare, even create fences around what we think of others. How often do we walk past those on the street in need doing everything we can to avoid eye contact? Where do we sit in a waiting room, or on a bus, or in a McDonalds? How often do we write off those we disagree with as

categorically wrong or simply stupid? "Thank God I'm not like that tax collector" today sounds like "Thank God I'm not like certain politicians or worse, like the people who support and vote for them?! The Pharisee's posture before God is inward focused and based on doing perceived good things. And this is tied to his contempt for the tax collector.

When our focus is inward, when we're convinced the most important part of our faith is what we DO or how we behave, then it isn't long before we find ourselves judging others who don't stack up to our hard work. When truth is because of Christ's rigorous work to save us and the world our lives of faith are enough to being about good in the world.

Problem is, anytime we draw lines between who's in and who's out we will find God on the other side. In the end, this parable isn't about self-righteousness and humility, it's not about these two men. It is about GOD.

And what happens with all that comparing is that sometimes as the synod wide LCC church body, we appear to only welcome certain people. We welcome people who don't have a house to live in as long as they're on the way to living in a house some time soon. We welcome addicts as long as they're seeking recovery. We welcome people with criminal records as long as they've turned their lives around. We welcome people who don't look like us or talk like us or worship like us as long as they start changing to become like us. We as the larger church in the world tend to welcome sinners as long as they're on the path to change.

And while the Word and Sacrament in the church DO create change and transformation and renewal, we can't command it or expect it or assume it will look like the way we do it. We don't always welcome perfectly here, but like we're constantly learning, growing, *stretching*.

Whether we pray like the Pharisee or like the tax collector, we are people who can only hold out hope that we're on the path toward being better BECAUSE OF CHRIST our Saviour WHO LIVES IN US AND DIRECTS OUT FEET INTO THE WAYS OF PEACE.

The tax-collector didn't pretend he was good. He didn't attempt to justify his actions or his own selfworth. He cheated people out of their hard earned cash and he KNEW it! As a matter of fact, the text doesn't say anything about the tax collector changing his ways once he left the scene! He might be going out to do the same thing again tomorrow. He's got his own sins that need God's forgiveness and its more important that he deal with his own than to point at others. That's also true for us. Out of humility, he couldn't even look up as he beat his chest and confessed, God be merciful to me, a sinner! And Jesus says that the tax collector has gone home justified. He's right with God! If any person of the world could do everything truly right, what is the need for Jesus Christ? This passage is an honest, important lesson in erasing any idea that we can do anything but fall on the mercy of God. The one who goes home justified isn't the one who turns his life around or gets it more right than not. The one who goes home justified is the one who recognizes their utter dependency on the mercy of God. The Pharisee will fall apart sooner or later, for all of us do. Even the ones who seem to have it all together – there just isn't anyone who's got it perfect. Except God. And He's the One who willingly justifies sinners. Bends over backwards to ensure we all have a way into His Kingdom. And why does God do this? Well, since we don't know if the tax collector actually changed his ways, God's justification has absolutely nothing to do with what we do or even what we pray. God justifies sinners because He loves us and wants us in a relationship with Him. We don't remain in friendships and relationships with people because of their perfect behavior, we do it out of love. And so does God.

God is so willing to fix things, to tear down comparison walls, that He lets His own Son pay the price. He descends from His Heavenly throne to get down deep into our mess, lower than the lowest, to simply lift up the whole world back to God washed clean in His shed Blood with His nail scarred hands as proof positive of our salvation! All Who see the cross as healing are lifted up to the Heavenly dwelling, while at the same time all who think they don't need God nor Jesus' cross are brought down. Jesus lifts up the lowly and brings down the arrogant. For He can only heal those who know they're sick.

Our can say that we're a mess at times. And God blesses that confession! Jesus forgives because we humbly acknowledge that we've fallen short and need Christ's grace as much as anyone else. Through the blood of Jesus Christ, you and I are forgiven. Through our Baptism into Jesus' death our reasons to self justify melt away in the face of compassion and mercy waiting to embrace us.

And right up here Jesus fully embraces us as one forgiven family of believers. When we stand before the Lord's Table and God's altar and all judgements and selfish cares all fall away as we kneel elbow to elbow eating Jesus' Body and drinking Jesus' Blood. This Holy Communion makes us one and no matter how different we might seem God sees us all as His dear children in need of His Son's nourishing feast.

We need not be embarrassed or afraid. It's OK to say "I'm stuck. It's lost. I'm overwhelmed." And we the church respond with "I know what it's like down here and you're not alone." We don't try to fix everything because we can't. And yet, by being compassionately able to see the world as someone else sees it, to put attitudes aside, by moving to stand alongside others to help and listen, we can see the world as our Lord sees it – in need of saving and forgiveness. And in our Christian witness we'll connect through the Spirit with other people in ways we might never expect.

So may our comparisons remain healthy. May we walk in newly transformed footsteps out of this place justified, taking God's love and forgiveness into every corner that all may say with us: God be merciful to us all as His dearly redeemed sinners.
