

The Holy Gospel: St. John 1: 29-42

The Holy Gospel, according to St. John, the 1st chapter:

# Glory be to Thee, O Lord. [Sung]

The next day John saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me." I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel.' And John testified, 'I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God.' The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi' (which translated means Teacher), 'where are you staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' (which is translated Anointed). He brought Simon to Jesus, who looked at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas' (which is translated Peter).

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise be to Thee, O Christ. [Sung]

# **REV. TODD HOEFFS**

**Epiphany 2** 

Scripture: John 1:29-42

Title: "What you see is what you get"

**January 15, 2023** 

You never get a second chance to make a 1<sup>st</sup> impression. If people show you their true self right away, believe them. Only about 16 percent of our communication is verbal.

All the rest is body language conveyed by emotions. It's best to live honest, open, kind and thoughtful. What you see is what you get. You see John as a strangely dressed preacher pouring Jordan river water Over peoples' heads – including his cousin Jesus' head.

The austere is ending. From the lips of a man who's lived in the desolate wilderness, Points to Jesus, on the river banks And says – LOOK! The LAMB of God Who takes away the sins of the world! Lamb of God, as familiar as it is unusual. The Lamb is an image of how God rescues His people from oppression. Israel had been Egypt's slaves. God told them to take blood from the Lamb [roasted at Passover] And paint it on the outer doorposts. The angel of death saw it and passed over that house, saving the 1st born son and the entire family. Because of this story, the lamb remained a strong symbol of God's faithfulness and deliverance. Hundreds of years after,

prophet Isaiah wrote about the Lord as the suffering sacrificial service, like a lamb led to slaughter. What's really interesting about this is when John the Baptizer speaks, The Greek Word chosen for LAMB means both sacrifice and servant. John's proclaiming to the people, All under the oppression of Rome, that God's promised Messiah is here as HIS LAMB come to bale you all out of a huge sinful mess! Jesus is the Lamb of God. He will shed his blood so all make be forgiven.

But the ideas floating around for a person called a Lamb is confusing. As a people, this could be scary and hopeless, it could be liberating and freeing. Even political. John's Gospel uses messianic imagery to underline its message that the Father sent the Son to overcome evil and darkness with light and truth. We know Jesus dies at the same time portrays when the Passover lambs are killed in the Temple (18:28; 19:31) and His death echoes Passover imagery (19:29,36).

The unbroken bones, The heat. The blood. The speed of the death Jesus brings deliverance. Once John points out Jesus as the Lamb, two of John's disciples leave him and start following Jesus. What they see and hear moves them to act on their faith. This is evangelism. See. Show. Share. The heart of preaching. The heart of sharing the Gospel. Witnessing your faith is simply noticing what God's doing in your lives, sharing that with others, and inviting them to come and see for themselves. We find this hard to do. We often forget or are too timid to talk about the Good news of Jesus. Part of this reluctance is because we just don't see God at work in our lives,

and we don't want to be caught in an embarrassing place. It's hard to share an experience you think you haven't had. It's hard to show someone something you haven't actually seen for yourself. It's easier talking about where to find the best bargains, Or best car, Or best team. But we all have personally experienced Christ at work in us. That's a big job for both pastors and people: Emphasize the day to day relevance of God in every part of our experiences. John experienced something his disciples hadn't, Jesus' amazing baptism. And John is eager to tell them about it. He wanted them to see it, too. "What are you looking for?" Good question Jesus offers. What Lamb do they expect? A sacrifice, a servant, a national image? Like they and the religious establishment then, Salvation had been reduced to "sin management". Behave, fear God, and

maybe, just maybe, God may look kindly down on you. At times and in eras past and present the very Gospel Word That so freeing and loving Has been reduced to a self-centered, ego Gospel. We think it's only about saving ourselves, and that's it. The very earth beneath our feet, all things living around us are all saved by the Blood of Jesus. Jesus looks at the disciples, He looks at you and me, and asks, "What are you looking for?" The Gospel, the good news, is found in how the disciples respond. They don't give him an answer. They ask him a question. "Teacher, where do you stay?" Again, John's Greek word used here is very significant. It is the same word for abide, dwell, remain. A central theme for John's Gospel.

Later John writes about us all abiding in Jesus. We live in Him and He in us, So Jesus simply says, "Come and See." This forever changes those 2 disciples. Through their seeing we are forever changed! Look, the Lamb of God touches a core desire in the heart.

We all want deliverance from pain and suffering. We need God to ease pain. We see throughout Jesus' life that most people wanted him for what they could get out of him. Today, I don't think it is much different. When we look at Jesus, it's very tempting to see him only as the lamb slain for our sins, so that we can be saved from pain and suffering. The Gospel must never be turned into a transaction. We have a sin need. God pays the price. We cash in, and we're done. We're baptized and communed. Thanks, God, it's a pleasure doing business with you. That's NOT the Gospel. Jesus invites us into a relationship with God. The entire world is Jesus' saving project. He says, "Come and See." A relationship is dynamic and vital, and it transforms us from the inside out. The Lamb of God Not only saves us and all things from sin and corruption, But He is inviting us into a relationship. His blood painted on wooden cross beams delivers us from our own selfishness and promises to transform us from the inside out and show us what real life is all about. And the best thing is, we don't have to hunt and search. God finds us and pours Christ in us with the Holy Spirit by baptism and faith. Jesus seeing Nathanael under the fig tree is not only some inspired insight. It is a word play around Jacob, who became Israel, a father of the nation. In life, Jacob was a trickster, deceiving. Jesus sees, discerns, knows, that in this Israelite Nathanael there is no deceit. So he will not only dream of angels climbing to heaven on a ladder, like Jacob did; he will see that Jesus is the ladder, the way to heaven. (Genesis 28) Like so many other parts of John's Gospel, this all happens at the right HOUR. The 10th hour. In ancient Biblical Hebrew time, that's about four o'clock in the afternoon. This is also no accident. The tenth hour is an unusual hour. Its late afternoon, and preparations would be made to begin dinner. Gathering the food, preparing the pot for cooking, setting out ingredients. Not so unusual. Jesus is the Bread of Life. Jesus is the River of Life. Jesus is the Royal Wine of Heaven. The perfect Lamb of the New Passover. Who laid down His life on the cross So that His Body and Blood In our bodies when we share Holy Communion -- Will draw our bodies and all people to Him And not only help people come and see, But live and abide in Him. Jesus was placed into the tomb for rest at the 10<sup>th</sup> hour, too. His work all complete. And when Jesus' disciples ran and saw in the tomb, They believed. This makes the Gospel miracle complete. What you see is what you get. A resurrected Lamb Who calls us to come and see. Come and see His presence among the least and lowly in our communities. Come and see what great weight is lifted with the words I love you, I forgive you. That's the Gospel. Jesus inviting us into His life. That's evangelism. One forgiven, loved person telling another person where to see and hear that they are loved and forgiven. In us, with Jesus in our lives, what they see is what they get. Amen.
