Cheez Whiz sandwiches are just one of the breakfast options that are being served at St. George's every day, <u>365 days a year</u>, for over 25 years. Each morning a team of 6-8 volunteers arrives at 6:30 a.m. to make porridge, coffee, sandwiches and cereal for the many in our community who are unable to provide themselves with a nutritious breakfast.


These volunteers are not just members of St. George's. They manage the program but depend on many others from the community to help with the day-to-day preparation, as well as donations from many in order to feed the hungry.

Christ Lutheran Church has agreed to help by making February "Cheez Whiz" month. We will be collecting donations of jars of CheezWhiz (<u>LARGE SIZE PLEASE, +900g</u>.) to contribute to the pantry there. There will be a box in the narthex, starting next week, where you can place your donation.



The Epistle: 1 Corinthians 1: 18-31

[St. Paul writes:] For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men. For consider your calling, brothers: not many of you were wise according to worldly standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, even things that are not, to bring to nothing things that are, so that no human being might boast in the presence of God. And because of him you are in Christ Jesus, who became to us wisdom from God, righteousness and sanctification and redemption, so that, as it is written, "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord."


The Holy Gospel: St. Matthew 5:1-12

REV. TODD HOEFFS EPIPHANY 4 Scripture: 1 Corinthians 1: 18-31 "Victory In Vulnerability" January 29, 2023

"The foolishness of God is wiser than men and the weakness of God is stronger than men." A very important and memorable passage for me personally. It's the 1st verse of Scripture I learned as a kid in Catechism class. At the age of 10 I didn't read much into it but somehow I knew it was special. Life has taught me to treasure the powerfully simple, comforting message. When we are weak within ourselves we are strong in the Lord. Many times it wound up becoming a pivotal passage. Strong encouraging word to a struggling art teacher / sub -- Forcing upon my heart a lessening of my own desire And replace it with a humble trust in God. Going with His guiding presence, so often quiet and hard to hear--The day I contacted the RC school I had taught in inner city Buffalo. The school principal Nun was just about to offer me a full-time art teaching job. Upon receipt of my letter, they joyously accepted this and encouraged me on this path of a "greater calling" as they put it. If that wasn't divine timing, I don't know what is. Foolishness of God is wiser than me/us. That He'd want me to be His pastoral vessel for everyone in Church life. I would have to trust that His strength would rest in my own weakness. Something that has carried me all through the years, A trust which has given way for hope and peace to grow. And what exactly gives confidence to a trusting faith – The message of Jesus' cross. We see images of crosses. I wear one. We like seeing crosses. We wear the cross on our forehead and heart from the day of our Baptism, A cross only God can see. The outside world will only see it by your Christ-like way of living. Don't be fooled thinking people of the world hates Christians because of the cross. We are not threatened here because of our message. Satan hates us because of Jesus' cross. Those who live evil hate Jesus' cross. People of our world need help. So often they never see Christ-like living from Christian people. Hence, Apostle Paul's message of the cross. We proclaim Christ crucified. A message. A Word. Signs and wisdom are things people usually see and trust. An educated Corinthian community responds well to images and intelligence. Jews are used to signs from God through the prophets. Greeks are used to philosophical learning and education. Both inevitably trust in the senses. Corinth is a seat of corruption and vice: the disparity between rich and poor painfully evident and, as one might expect under such circumstances, rampant selling of anything you imagine for pleasure. In Paul's time, Corinth is where fortunes are made and lost quickly—The epitome of lavish life on the Vegas Strip. When trusting God is hard, Trusting people is harder still. So trust in ideas. Thoughts. Ideals. Some define human wisdom as the art of living well to be happy. To take care of YOU – organize life to escape any and all problems. Especially any sort of pain or suffering. Usually this promotes only immediate, emotional responses This causes fogginess is making life choices Always seeking a feeling or a sign - Lost in depression and failure, it's so easy to discover It's not possible to be happy at all – when the truth is, we can't be happy alone, without others, apart from God. Satan wants us isolated, alone, like islands, disconnected from any Word Apart from his lies. Saint Paul speaks somewhat negatively about this wisdom because in the name of human wisdom Jesus got condemned to death. Jesus disturbed the established order, called social hierarchies into question and changed peoples' notions of God and His Kingdom. He appeared to be a politically dangerous fool, even a crazy man. Real wisdom is found in the message, more specifically, the language of the cross. Language here is beyond the mere fact of the cross, and is centered in the context of Jesus' entire life -human, divine, perfect, holy, suffering dying --ending in the glorious resurrection light – in the overarching plan of God's covenant with us to save us. "Message" is the Greek word logos, which to the Jews could be recall the Torah or Biblical wisdom, while to the Greeks it stood for the reason behind the cosmic order. In using that word Paul

shows that message of the cross is contrary to both the prideful religious mind and the arrogant reasoned mind. The logos of the cross is not merely good advice to us, telling us what we must do to be saved. Rather, that logos is a message about what God has done. More than that, the cross itself is HIS power at work doing what we cannot do. The message of the cross is not a system of thought or a way of life; Its God's working to save those who cannot save themselves, over and over, no matter how hard they think or how well they live. The cross looks foolish because Jesus really did nothing to escape it - that He really should have found a road around the cross. That's what human wisdom expects. Death = failure. Especially dying innocently. The message of the cross proves the power of love and just how far Jesus' gift of his life reaches. The rejection of God by the "wise", and He turned it into total solidarity with the "fools" that we are. The condemnation of Jesus for blasphemy, and Jesus turned it into the forgiveness of those who crucified him and the return of all humanity back to God. So the Christian's idea of happiness is enlightened by the foolishness of Jesus' love. The art of living well conforms to that total gift of self that is the life—and the death—of Jesus! Our Lord's strength within our weakness is God's power at work. Jesus was never seen as wise or strong by most of the eyes which looked at Him. He's born to a mother and father among the lowest of the low within Jewish society. Carpenters were your basic "fix it" people who patched up people's things because they didn't own any land. While he had an interesting and once promising career as a travelling rabbi and gained guite a following, Jesus' popularly waned early on. Jesus was supposed to be the Messiah and play that role. But he failed to garner the support of enough people. Further, He failed to devise the necessary strategy to cast the Romans out of Palestine, the most necessary part of the messiah's job description. After a brief parade, betraval, hasty trial and unnecessary torture, Jesus is publicly executed on a cross, along with two others. While many people survived the torture for days, Jesus died after only about 6 hours. Alone. Even all but one of His disciples runs away and hides. Looks like Jesus lost. It. All. Paul tells a different story. He claims, rather unbelievably, that the one who lost so completely was not only loved by God, chosen by God, called beloved at His Baptism, but represents the very wisdom and the way of God to bring change to the human race. Change from the old ways of sin to the new way of grace. The cross is not the failure of Jesus but his triumph, and not only Jesus' triumph but it is God's triumph over evil. The cross marks the new way of living which trusts that God will bring out the good for those who love and follow Him. Jesus' cross shows how God works in the world – He enters deeply into the pain of human existence and the pain caused by human failure and meets us there. The Judean leaders wanted signs - they wanted results. The Greeks wanted to make sense of things.

Both of these are a part of a culture in which people boast, that is: seek power over each other in status games. God doesn't play status games. God isn't about earthly winning. God invites us into the celebration of a game already won, a war long over, a fight already resolved. A celebration where all people are seen as God's children, worthy of love, full of dignity, and respect. In Jesus' acceptance of the cross rather than to take up arms, Jesus shows the wisdom of God to risk His very self so that we might see the foolishness of our struggling world.

We all grew up in a culture which has been progressing in self-serving directions--

- The way things are
- The reality of the situation
- What common sense tells us
- That the ladder climbers always win
- It's each person for themselves
- The cream rises to the top
- That we are powerless to change things
- Nice people finish last

But God's wisdom is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength. But NOT because God is stronger by comparison – He's perfect almighty divine and we are mere mortals.... The message of the cross proves that what is stronger than human strength Is DIVINE VULNERABILITY—God is willing to be weak, to be one of us, to become lower than us, to even die. God is willing to be a loser to change the game so that all can win together. God joins human beings in our weakness and vulnerability.

He takes the side of the most vulnerable in the chaos of society's injustice. This means that we can learn to embrace our own vulnerability and know that we are loved precisely there.

This means that when we are vulnerable within a culture, that we can follow Christ and work for real peace, peace for ourselves and peace for our neighbor. We can be the very faces of Christ in accompanying the vulnerable in our culture as we together seek peace and hope. Because the message of the cross speaks of our identity.

We are baptized into Christ to be Christ to the world.

As we do this, we will likely experience tensions, conflict and suffering.

We can ignore the devilish so-called "debater of the age" – his words are hollow. We live in the power of Christ who is the source of our life, crucified and risen, and we know a different wisdom.

A trusting wisdom. A growing wisdom from a life experiencing both loss and success, mercy and grace, sin and forgiveness with a new start every day.

[Mention CONFIRMANDS embracing the cross message & Bible reading]
