



He sees many things, but does not observe them; his ears are open, but he does not hear. The LORD was pleased, for his righteousness' sake, to magnify his law and make it glorious. But this is a people plundered and looted; they are all of them trapped in holes and hidden in prisons; they have become plunder with none to rescue, spoil with none to say, "Restore!"


The Holy Gospel: *St. John 9: 1-7, 13-17, 34-41* The Holy Gospel, according to St. John, the 9th chapter:

Glory to You, O Lord.

As [Jesus] passed by, he saw a man blind from birth. And his disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "It was not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God might be displayed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." Having said these things, he spit on the ground and made mud with the saliva. Then he anointed the man's eyes with the mud and said to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). So he went and washed and came back seeing...They brought to the Pharisees the man who had formerly been blind. Now it was a Sabbath day when Jesus made the mud and opened his eyes. So the Pharisees again asked him how he had received his sight. And he said to them, "He put mud on my eyes, and I washed, and I see." Some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, for he does not keep the Sabbath." But others said, "How can a man who is a sinner do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said again to the blind man, "What do you say about him, since he has opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."... They answered him, "You were born in utter sin, and would you teach us?" And they cast him out. Jesus heard that they had cast him out, and having found him he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered, "And who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, and it is he who is speaking to you." He said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped him. Jesus said, "For judgment I came into this world, that those who do not see may see, and those who see may become blind." Some of the Pharisees near him heard these things, and said to him, "Are we also blind?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would have no guilt; but now that you say, 'We see,' your guilt remains.



John 9:1-41 Blinded by the Light March 19, 2023

It's easy to look without seeing. How many of us can go to the fridge, open the door,

Look for a specific item, there it is, in plain sight – But we can't see it!?

Some times our minds already think they know even if our eyes see something different.

The 4 Gospel accounts in Scripture bear witness To 4 different people encountering the ONE Christ in different ways. [Drawing with a towel to teach observing]

[Teaching contour drawing in Art classes.]

Watching and looking and seeing. People can see many things and make incorrect judgements.

Like if something bad happens, it's because someone sinned -- And the problem proves God's unleashed anger. This had been a common belief held by religion and culture.

It's totally false. Human problems are not equal to God getting even.

But this is why the disciples want to know "who's responsible" and "who's to blame" for this man's situation. Did it ever dawn on them how insulting it is to view a man blind from birth as a troublesome obstacle, a nuisance to be pushed out of the way? The man is a beggar.

The disciples are afflicted with a much more dangerous blindness. Jesus opens their eyes to the reality of human suffering. IT IS NOT because of God's punishment. Jesus instead meets suffering with mercy, compassion and healing. Jesus, the Light of the world, completing his mission of mercy work, Tells it plainly: It's not that this man sinned, or his parents, but that the works of God will be displayed for all to see & believe. It's not about who is wrong, But the amazing miraculous ways Jesus interacts with His people! Sight is a gift of creation. Jesus uses dirt from the ground, earth's dust-- from which He originally created Adam and all people. Dirt mixed with His divine spit, A holy water you might say, And rubs this mud over the blind man's eyes. The only Word spoken is Jesus' pointing him to the pool of Siloam. Mud and water are Earth's elements — here they heal the body and carry Jesus' healing power. The man goes, washes off the mud, and he sees!

This story isn't just about the replacement of blindness with human vision. It's about the struggle of light with darkness,

It's about the fight between good and evil, It's about overcoming all fear and hopelessness with holy sight and confidence in Jesus. This is also about overcoming our fears of people who are different from us and welcoming them into our faith communities. We need to recognize and be aware of accessibility and welcome as core practices of our faith so we can follow God's call -- inviting all people to participate actively in the grace and growth of our witnessing into all communities. Blind people are often ignored or not believed or viewed as unreliable witnesses.

This happens twice in this Gospel story. 1st when the guy's neighbours refuse to believe in his healing. 2nd when the religious leaders don't believe and call on the man's parents.

The person with the disability becomes invisible-nonexistent. This still happens all the time with many kinds of disabilities. Because a person is lacking in a certain area or life they're marginalized.

When the healed man boldly speaks up for himself He's seen as too pushy or aggressive.

The religious authorities in this story are afflicted with blindness of a similar kind. Unmoved by a miracle never seen from the dawn of creation, they remain fixated on a legal technicality.

This is a sabbath day. Saturday. Holy Day of rest. Jesus makes mud and that's doing work.

No one works on the Sabbath. Jesus then is labeled sinner and sinners can't perform miracles.

So, either the miracle didn't happen or it happened apart from Jesus. Though they have the testimony of the blind man who now sees; The testimony of those who knew him before and after the miracle and the testimony of his parents that he has been blind since birth.

None of that matters. He even glorifies God for this gift! When he can't be bullied, threatened or cajoled into changing his testimony, the religious authorities insult him, ridicule him and cast him out. They are willingly and intentionally blind to facts that do not accord with their own view of reality. They cannot see the prophet, the Man from God, that this healed man now sees.

They cannot see the new life, the new man, the new creation that bears testimony to Man of God. No one, as the saying goes, is more blind than he or she who chooses not to see. They have chosen power, rules, and boundaries over the truth and their eyes have grown dim.

[Common today about truth we want to match our minds] Even this man's own parents' distance themselves from him. They can talk about their blind son but not about their seeing son.

To see him, the enlightened son, means they have to tell the story. "We do not know how it is that now he sees, nor do we know who opened his eyes. They deny what they see. Fear does that. Fear keeps us from seeing a larger reality, from living with a larger vision. So we live with tunnel vision only seeing that one thing that we most fear. A common psychology term for this now is DENIALISM. Foolishness, ignorance, lack of experience, all can be taught and informed.

DENIALISM is a person's choice to deny reality as a way to avoid an uncomfortable truth.

In fact a person will only hear and see truth If it matches up with what they think they already know.

Blindness is not about the quality of our vision or the condition of our eyes. It is not about the darkness around us, But the darkness within us. How we see others, what we see in the world, the way we see life is less about the objects of our seeing and more about ourselves.

We do not see God, people, things, or circumstances as they are but as we are. Until our eyes are opened by Christ Which begins in our baptismal washing And lives on, with greater vision, with a life of faith Propelled by the Holy Spirit. [Cell phone pics as opposed to looking in a mirror.]

Without faith, seeing is just a projection of ourselves onto the world. What we see and how we see manifest our inner world. They reveal our fears, attachments, and deep beliefs. We can be blind to the things we should see, Maybe people who need us or our help Or blind to the change God is evoking within us we ignore. True seeing begins in the heart not the eyes. Recognizing our own fears, attachments, and beliefs that impair and muddy our viewpoint. Living in denial is living lies. It's dangerous because it can make a person easily manipulated. Attracted to authoritarian bullies who echo their prejudices, give them scapegoats to blame for their unhappiness and offer them simplistic solutions to complex problems. Living in denial makes us feel more important, bigger, stronger, smarter, more in control. Sometimes you and I are a lot like the blind man – alone in the world surrounded by people who don't care. People simply do not see what we see, or know what we know about God in our lives. Maybe we're the only ones who feel as though our eyes have been opened to by Jesus passing through our lives and giving us healing, renewal and life.

Sometimes we are also like the blind man's community. We think we know the faith and what Jesus does and doesn't do. We can't see how Jesus is doing something so unexpected, That He's at work in ways we think He can't or shouldn't or love people who don't fit our image of a Christian.

Sometimes, you have to be blind before you can see. Sometimes you need to unlearn everything you think you know before you can know truly. It isn't the blind man can see, it's that he's the only who can <u>now</u> see. The whole community is blind to this transformation. Only the man can see what Jesus has done for him. And no matter how many times, how many ways he tells the story of his own healing, the community around him just cannot understand or accept this new reality.

Then, when all is said and done, Jesus comes back to the man who sees. He who has died to himself, died to the old ways of seeing, Lives new to himself, to God, and to the world.

Blind religious leader's manipulation turns Jesus into a criminal, a liar, a sinner, a breaker of the law, condemned to death, blinded by the sins of the world. Jesus, Who meets us in the wilderness, finds us in the dark, who makes us alive with Living Water.... this One comes back and restores and fills us up with faith. Just as He returns to Jerusalem after taking His earthly ministry to every place in Israel's surrounding country. He returns and in doing so, sanctions all the work that has gone on before Him. He is the better sacrifice. His blood running down from the cross is the true Lamb. His whipped, sore, agonizing body is a sweeter offering than any animal or grain.

All who look upon Him and His cross with eyes of faith see the glory of God's Kingdom, Where our suffering is soothed in Jesus' suffering. Jesus comes to us and meets us again, fills us with a word of light and hope, when life makes us tired and sore. The blind man's story is our story.

We experience new life and renewal in Jesus who comes to us, creating something new and incredible inside us. When His Flesh and Blood sacrifices runs through our veins We see clearly what the people of the world need And the Gospel message we have to share by our living.

Even if we are met with stubborn blindness, the Gospel still leads.

And Jesus keeps coming back and coming back. Jesus keeps giving words of mercy and forgiveness, the light of God's word, the renewal of our faith in the Body of Christ.

Week after week, year after year. God's vision for us and His church is to start paying attention to the perspectives of people we often ignore, including people who wear the label "disability."

We need to create an environment where fear of differences is replaced by encouraging all people to share their gifts even when God calls some to lead us in ways that threaten the status quo. We need to stop insisting on barriers and labels like "spiritual blindness" and instead begin to see the man in John 9 and all of our neighbors as real people whose witness matters.

God calls us into a new way: working together, needing each other, being the body of Christ.

So that all people are drawn to see what we see.

Jesus Who is life and light.
