



We had a meeting on Wednesday, September 20th to discuss what we need to do to prepare for Kareem and his family to live here with us in St. Catharines.





Ameer who will soon be 6 has his first loose tooth. Ameer and Asser have just recently been given a number of marbles of all

different colours. Ameer has started school again and has been taught the way to write the Greek alphabet. Ameer has a backpack with sports balls on it to go to school. Asser wants to go to school as well but he is not old enough, and he has a backpack with Spiderman on it. Yes Spiderman has invaded the refugee camps too!!!!

Ameer was born on November 15, 2017, so he will be 6 years old in November *Asser was born on January 9, 2020*, so will be 4 in the new year.

Who will be the first to celebrate their birthday in Canada??????? We will continue to give you news and updates each week. We discussed the budget that had been presented to the Council last week.

REFUGEE SUPPORT FOR A YEAR:

A very preliminary budget looks like it may be \$38,208 minimum to support them for the year.

The original estimate from 2020 as per the government was \$25,000. But housing costs have increased the budget dramatically. We have been blessed that the gifts of money have been given to the Refugee Fund totaling \$33,252 to date. So there is still a need for more donations. Please pray about this.

We are obligated to provide: a basic needs allowance, monthly housing allowance, Monthly bus pass, internet and phones.

START UP COSTS:

We are also obligated to provide certain startup costs separate from the ongoing monthly monetary support. We had planned from the start to minimize this cost through physical donations from the congregation and community.

Start-up costs include: a staple allowance; basic clothing allowance; winter clothing allowance, basic household needs; furniture allowance, linens, and utility installation.

The only requirement in this category is that **all mattresses and shoes and boots must be purchased new.** Plus a \$150 school start-up per school age child.

We are in the process of compiling a list of what is needed for each room in the apartment, plus a list of linens, a list of staples to start out in the kitchen, and any other miscellaneous other things required for setting up an apartment.

Once the lists have been completed we will post them for anyone who wishes to donate items. Donations of good used things are acceptable, and of course any food staples donated must have a current date.

THE WORD

The Old Testament: Jonah 3:10 – 4:11

When God saw what they did, how they turned from their evil ways, God changed his mind about the calamity that he had said he would bring upon them, and he did not do it....But this was very displeasing to Jonah, and he became angry. He prayed to the Lord and said, "O Lord! Is not this what I said while I was still in my own country? That is why I fled to Tarshish at the beginning, for I knew that you are a gracious and merciful God, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love, and relenting from punishment. And now, O Lord, please take my life from me, for it is better for me to die than to live." And the Lord said, "Is it right for you to be angry?" Then Jonah went out of the city and sat down east of the city and made a booth for himself there. He sat under it in the shade, waiting to see what would become of the city. The Lord God appointed a bush and made it come up over Jonah, to give shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort, so Jonah was very happy about the bush. But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm that attacked the bush, so that it withered. When the sun rose, God prepared a sultry east wind, and the sun beat down on the head of Jonah so that he was faint and asked that he might die. He said, "It is better for me to die than to live." But God said to Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry about the bush?" And he said, "Yes, angry enough to die." Then the Lord said, "You are concerned about the bush, for which you did not labor and which you did not grow; it came into being in a night and perished in a night. ¹¹ And should I not be concerned about Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand persons who do not know their right hand from their left and also many animals?" This is the word of the Lord.



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The Epistle: Philippians 1:21-30

[St. Paul writes:] For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me, yet I cannot say which I will choose. I am hard pressed between the two: my desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better, but to remain in the flesh is more necessary for you. Since I am convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with all of you for your progress and joy in faith, so that, by my presence again with you, your boast might abound in Christ Jesus because of me. Only, live your life in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that, whether I come and see you or am absent and hear about you, I will know that you are standing firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel and in no way frightened by those opposing you. The Holy Gospel:St. Matthew 20:1-16The Holy Gospel, according to St. Matthew, the 20th chapter:Glory to You, O Lord.

Jesus says: "For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for a denarius for the day, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace, and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around, and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received a denarius. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received a denarius. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for a denarius? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise to You, O Christ.

THE APOSTLES' CREED:

As God's people through our baptism into Christ, let us confess our faith. I believe in God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth. REV. TODD HOEFFS & JAMES HYATT Pentecost 17 Scripture: Matthew 20:1-16 September 24, 2023

Have you ever been jealous? Have you ever watched as someone else received the recognition or reward you expected? You had to smile and congratulate someone who you knew didn't deserve this prize any more than you did, while inside you wish you'd be the one getting the pats on the back. Been there? Sometimes, life just isn't fair. Sometimes others get what we think we should have. And it's no fun. Our human nature wants to see the pie divided evenly. We want everyone to be treated fairly, but we especially want to be treated *more* fairly than anyone else. And when we have to stand aside and watch someone else get the glory, or the promotion or the better job or the nicer house or the best deal, it gives us pain. We get what the ancient Greeks called the "evil eye" – that green-eyed monster, envy, ruins our joy. Comparison is the thief of joy. The grass in the neighbour's yard isn't any greener than yours. It's perspective. It's trust. It's value. It's Who is really your GOD? Matthew's Gospel spends a lot of time presenting Jesus as the key to God's Kingdom. Following Jesus means confronting those who've wronged us. And that means forgiving over and over again, far beyond the expectations of reasonably polite behaviour. Jesus today is showing us the real problem is US and how that is resolved deep inside each one of us. This parable story of the Vineyard workers is an easy message for Jesus' audience then. But Jesus offers a unique angle that would be very unusual. Vineyard owners in ancient times were the top 1 percent of the culture. They don't hire workers. Managers do that. We would not expect Bezos to be hiring packers for the Amazon conveyor belt. This is part of the uniqueness of the message. God is the Vineyard owner. Managers have come and gone. Biblical vineyard "managers" are the patriarchs, prophets, judges, kings, Like Moses, David, Solomon, Elijah, Malachi; then 400 years of prophetic silence. The Vineyard owner keeps going to the marketplace to find new workers Because GOD had to come back down to earth And re-create all that had become overgrown. This is also unique: Wealthy landowners did not do this. That is below their stature and reputation. And if he "did" do this out of strangeness, he'd do it 1st thing in the morning and know exactly how many is needed. Even for those listening in on this, they would not only think rich folks did this, but they believed God would not do this either. How many people you may know who feel God is far removed, away, gone, Not caring what goes on here. Abandoned us. Religious leaders then made sure the space between human and God was far away. They felt it was better for people to keep trying to get close to God, Do more, give more, sacrifice more, yet not move one step closer. Jesus is a master storyteller. He knows the way to set up the scene to grab his hearers' attention. Jewish history records that after the great Temple had been re-built by Herod, 18,000 workers were unemployed. To meet their needs,

and to make sure the Temple treasury was never so full of money that it would draw the attention of the Romans, it became customary for the Temple to "hire" workers to do minimal labor, while receiving a full day's pay.

That is a denarius. A low normal day's pay. 10am – 4pm. Consider life under Roman rule with Roman currency. A young Roman foot soldier, for example, would take home: 11,800 denarii a year. Food for wife and children: 9,600 denarii per year. Care for sword and helmet by servant: 600 denarii per year. New footwear: 100 denarii a year. Remaining pay: 1500 denarii a year = \$15,000 2023 money! Not bad as a slush fund! Yet, most things costing 1 denarius was food in the marketplace. Loaves of fresh bread cost 4-6 denarii. It puts into perspective the money isn't great, but believable to Jesus' audience And makes sense. To many, this guy is a gracious landowner or foolish with his cash. The Law of God insist that laborers be paid at the end of each day they work. Before sun down. This way it can be spent on food to keep them alive. Workers and their pay are understood in light of the Vineyard owner's generosity. Those willing to enter and become part of the Vineyard life, are rewarded with pay. Those idly wasting time are any outsiders who refuse to enjoy the life God offers. Free life and yet gives rewards! How overly generous. The day's wages are given to each person no matter how much or little they work. God treats us all alike and yet comes to us individually at different times and in different stations in our lives and helps us according to our need. Some work in the hot sun all day and get the same denarius As the ones who come in at the end and do very little. Because it's not the amount of hard work that is valued. Entering into the Vineyard life with the owner and helping him as best you can Is really all he seems to care about. How often have we heard things like this in the life of the church from our own Experiences on committees and teams and councils. "You better put those candles up there cuz I bought them and I want them used." I was in a church once. On the altar sat a very old, ornate and large Bible with gold trim on the sides and lots of names written in the front cover like a monk signed it in pen and ink. A pastor removed it from the altar to place his prayer book there, and a member made a bee line to him who outwardly looked mad. "Don't remove that Bible! It's been there for 48 yrs. My parents bought it, opened it to the Psalm 23 passage and it hasn't been touched since!" That's a problem. Salvation is not favouritism and it's never tied to things. God's love moves above and beyond territory and ownership. All that we have is from God. We are all invited into His Vineyard and we are given free access and a wage at the end of the day. Pretty nice deal. The work in the Vineyard is our faith. We witness that faith every day. We share with those in need no matter if it be time, talents or our treasures. But faith is a gift from God by Baptism into His Son and His Kingdom. Complaining about who is in 1st, or who works harder is ridiculous. It's part of our sin which wants recognition for being the best. There's no such thing as perfection plus. Just as being a wayward living, Over-indulgent abuser of everything imaginable Doesn't make the late day wage of the Gospel sweeter or better. Whatever hang-ups, or addictions, or bad habits we might have, Those same stubborn sin we've had for years, are no big deal -- Compared to those who break all the 10 commandments wildly every day. That's an unhealthy comparison. We can easily start to feel self-conscious about our sin! Not that we're ashamed of it- it's almost that we're ashamed that we don't have a more interesting list of sins to confess! As if sin adds to our value somehow! And we might even begin to think that since our own sins are so much less serious than those of hardened criminals, maybe we don't really need to confess them and have Jesus forgive us? This is the trap the vineyard workers have fallen

into. And it's so easy. And it makes Satan so happy when we allow ourselves to start thinking along these lines.

Because that's the little open door he needs to slide in to our lives, and pretty soon, we are getting worse. And if we aren't careful, suddenly we've become the hardened, Angry, bitter people. That life that we admired and envied, like those vineyard workers, envying the idleness of the latecomers, has suddenly become ours. Except it's worse, because we've moved from the safety of the vineyard, back into the idleness of the daily world. A Christian has further to fall. His or her poor witness hurts us all. Rather may we rejoice in the pleasant surprise When we all get to share in this wonderful reward, How wonderful that the Vineyard owner is a generous spirit. Then the work is a joy. The work of the Gospel is a humbled privilege. That God takes care of everyone, the last, the lost, the lonely, the loved, and the loyal. Wow. All workers in God's Vineyard are debt free. Grace is dangerous. It reverses business as usual. "So the last will be first, and the first will be last." That's not how a wage based society works. Our understanding of fairness does not have priority in the kingdom of heaven where grace is the rule not the exception. Grace looks beyond our productivity, our appearance, our dress, our race or ethnicity, our accomplishments, our failures. Grace recognizes there is more to you and who you are than what you have or haven't done. This is what eventually killed the Vineyard owner's Son. Religious and political and sinful human forces hated God's love And killed Jesus' wide loving welcome, Who embraces all into His waiting arms Outstretched on the wood not from a vineyard But from a tree of death. A cross of torture which secures our peace and place in the Kingdom. Jesus' precious Blood becomes the Royal Wine we share as we celebrate our unity That no matter how old or young, new member of old time believer. We are one and the same. We are the Body of Jesus, The Body we're baptized into, the Body we eat in the Bread of peace. God's grace isn't something you can earn or something you deserve because you've been working in the vineyard since the sun came up. God's grace is freely given to all who receive the Son of God by faith And live a life of worship and serving in the Vineyard garden of life on this earth. The length of time matters not. So that everyone has time to enjoy the way to life with God. Living in grace leaves no room for envy or anger.

Jesus inspires us with His Spirit to make disciples, not comparisons.

Instead of whining about what used to be or what some other church has,

Christ simply has us show His face to the world when we show them ours. Today is the day of grace.

No more comparing; no more competing;

Community and Communion in our Vineyard Venture. Amen.
